For those not familiar with Bushnell Optics, let's delve into the features of the Engage X:

- The 10x42 binos are a good option for hunting, birding, hiking, camping, or enjoying sporting events - especially in wide-open spaces where the high magnification and wide field of view really shine.
- With multiple anti-reflective coatings and Bushnell's EXO Barrier for a clear view in any conditions, you can be assured of bright, sharp, and clear high-contrast views even at dawn or dusk.
- The EXO Barrier is a protective lens coating technology Bushnell has devel-

oped for their range of optics. The EXO Barrier molecularly bonds to the lens and fills microscopic pores in the glass. The ultra-slick coating that repels water, oil, fog, dust and debris -- rain, snow, fingerprints and dirt will not stick, giving you clarity when you need it most.

- BAK-4 prism allows more light transmission and offers a brighter image as a

  and dirty.




## So how does the Bushnell Engage X binocular perform out in the field?

To date, I have used these binos for bush stalking, surf viewing, and glassing open ridge faces in low light and been impressed at how they have helped me to spot game and study the finer land-scape features.

The Bushnell Engage X will suit the beginners. However, I say this lightly because I could have easily mistaken some of the features such as low light clarity or tough construction for a more

expensive model. This doesn't feel like a cheap model and is a contender as a decent hunting optic. Certainly, the Engage X does miss on some of the features of more expensive models so let's analyze them further:

Limited close focus: Close focus distance is not something on everyone's mind, and I highly doubt that when someone intends to invest in binoculars that they are getting them for such purposes as watching flowers and insects regularly. Birding, hunting, and nature observation are more common choices. Therefore, this is more of a usage limitation as opposed to a construction issue and I don't see that it would affect the user's enjoyment.

**Edge clarity:** This would only disappoint the more seasoned bino user and wouldn't be an issue for beginners.

**Protective case:** Tailored more towards those who want to stow their binos in the car or cupboard. A lack of padding means the case isn't as robust as it could be for the knocks you experience out in the field.

## Why consider the Bushnell Engage X?

**Build:** The protective rubber armor with raised palm pads provides a solid and secure slip-resistant grip. The focus wheel is light to the touch and smooth to adjust. The weight comes in at a comfortable 620g.

**Clarity:** The clarity and resolving power is exceptional. You can see minute details in a variety of light and landscapes that would usually be difficult to make out with other binocular brands that sit within this price range.

The contrast is also very good, colours are vivid and bright, lending to a superb depth of field for those scanning wider horizons.

Price: The biggest winner, coming in at \$399.99.
